Interest Shown In High School.

Both Propositions Defeated.

At the special election held Friday in school district No. 77 both propositions before the people were defeated. A total of 99 votes was cast and 48 of these were in favor of erecting a \$6000 high school building while 51 were cast in opposition. The other proposition of raising the present school building and adding more rooms polled a vote of 31 for and 65 against.

The matter must now be given up for the present for it will be impossible to give sufficient notice to the voters or to erect a suitable building before the opening of the fall term of school.

There are several pupils here who are high school students but will have to attend elsewhere for the present. With the completion of an electric road to Stayton many more residents will come here and it will be easier upon all parties to erect a suitable high school building when the voters decide to do so.

Great interest was shown by the voters and all concerned.
