The Oregon Electric Company last week filed a mortgage for \$10,000, 100 on its line between Salem and Portland, and all proposed extensions in Oregon, covering the Hillsboro-Forest Grove extension.

John F. Caples, one of the best known attorneys in Oregon and a pioneer, died at his home in Portland last week. Mr. Caples was the United States representative to Chile during McKinley's administration.

C. G. Smith and L. G. Clayton, of Oregon City, and Jack Linehart were arrested last week at Molalla by Sheriff Beattie, of Clackamas county, charged with dynamiting fish in Molalla river.

Following the lead of Portland's physicians in making war on "quack" doctors and questionable sanitariums, the Eastern Oregon Medical Association will probably take some official action to indorse the move started in this state.

J. T. Turner, a prosperous young farmer residing six miles east of Salem, disappeared last week and no trace of him can be found. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World and the members of that order are putting forth every effort to aid his grief-stricken family in finding what became of him.

The Oregon State Penitentiary Minstrels, "Phillip Sousa, director," gave their second annual public entertainment at the state prison last week. Under the rules of the institution the inmates true names or numbers are not allowed to be printed upon the programme, so in order to circumvent this difficulty the convicts adopted the names of the most prominent in American minstrelsy.

After over two years' incarceration and after having been tried and acquitted of two murders, Steve Adams, noted the world over as a Western Federation man, arrived in Baker City last week, and expressed the intention of making it his home

Construction work on the extension of the Salem, Falls City & Western railroad has been commenced between Dallas and Salem, and will be pushed to completion.

Frayed and tattered and torn, crippled and forlorn, bent with the weight of nearly four-score years, he shuffled weakly into the office—an old tramp printer. Every year or so has he shown up thus, hopelessly seeking the work he could no longer do—trudging on and ever with the few alms bestowed from time to time. This trip he had just come from Arizona, he said, in his quavering voice—a matter of 43 days in the scorching heat, by foot, by wagon by box car—a wearisome journey from Nowhere to a Somewhere never attainable. More than 50 years ago, he said, he had run the Oregonian's first press, a Washington hand press. He had helped to print the first paper in Jackson county. Twenty-five years ago he had worked on the Weston Leader, and again ten years later. Now he had become a human derelict, a yellowed page from the book of an almost forgotten past. For him there is no goal but death, no rest but the grave, no mission but to provide an object lesson of the thoughtless improvidence that in reckless, riotous youth impels men to rob themselves grown older of a livelihood.—Weston Leader.
