**Council Meeting Friday Eve'g. Short Session.**

The regular adjourned meeting of the City Council was held in the city hall on Friday evening last with the mayor and three councilmen present, as follows: Mayor W. L. Freres, Councilmen Brewer, Gardner and Streff, Marshal Smith. Absent, Recorder Elwood and Treasurer Roy.

The meeting was called to order by the mayor and after the reading of the minutes of the previous meeting the following bills were read and ordered paid:

The matter of licensing the "near beer" saloons was then taken up and a committee was appointed to investigate the proposition and report at the next regular meeting.

A committee was also appointed to investigate the procuring of some one to care for the city pumping station. In the matter of building fires for

tire setting by the blacksmiths, the marshal was instructed to have a talk with the smiths here to ascertain what arrangements could be made to make it less dangerous to build fires for tire setting.
