To prevent salt in saltcellars from becoming damp and lumpy, when filling them put in ten to twelve pieces of rice," says WOMANS HOME COMPANION for September. "This will not come through the holes in the cover of the saltcellars, but will break the lumps of salt and gather the moisture; thus the salt is always dry and fine."
