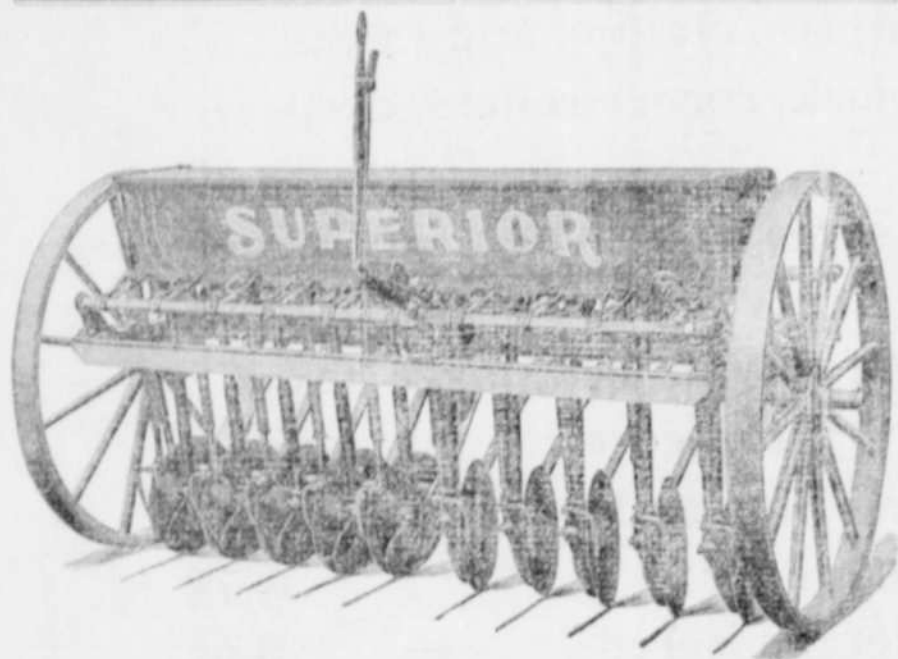

Milk Condenser For  
Stayton.

On Thursday evening, plans were  
laid for a Milk Condenser for our city.  
Through the efforts of C W Tebault of  
Albany, the people were gotten to-  
gether and a regular booster meeting  
was held, which was well attended by  
citizens from all sections.

The meeting was called to order by  
C W Tebault, after a few remarks J T  
Kearns placed the nomination of Fred  
G Conley as temporary chairman. He  
after taking the chair asked for a sec-  
retary and was favored with the nomi-  
nation of W. F. Chase. With a few  
brief remarks the meeting was gotten  
under way and many questions were  
answered by the speaker, Mr. Tebault.

After discussing the various phases  
the following routine was carried out.  
A motion was made that a committee  
of nineteen be appointed to solicit  
subscriptions for capital stock, with  
the result that the following gentle-  
men were chosen by the citizens pres-  
ent: M. W. Hunt, Waldow Hills; T. J.  
Follis, Kingston; W. R. Surry, Lyons;  
J. T. Kearns, Dr Beauchamp, Stayton;  
Clarence S. Bowne, Charles Bernice,  
Aumsville, Ernest Long, Evert Down-  
ing, Sublimity; M. R. Ryan, Pleasant  
Hill, Lewis Geisler, James Leffler, J.  
H. Habberman, Seio; Nick Guymer,  
Kingston; Frank Munkers, Stayton;  
E. Forette, Stayton; Frank Potter,  
Mill City; P. C. Freres and J. H. Apple  
Fern Ridge. These men were con-  
firmed and it was ordered that the sec-  
retary inform them of their appoint-  
ment.

It was moved that the sentiment  
of this meeting be that we circulate  
a petition to build a forty thousand  
pound capacity condenser, which met  
with the unanimous approval of all  
present.

Among those who spoke in the fore-  
part of the evening were W. H. Coup-  
er who was the first one of our citi-  
zens to arouse interest in the propo-  
sition. He stated in his talk that he  
had visited with friends at Amity  
and while there was fully convinced  
that a milk condenser would be the  
proper thing for Stayton, when he  
returned he began talking the propo-  
sition and through his having taken  
the matter up correspondence was  
started and Mr. Tebault was secured  
to come here in the interest of the  
proposition.

Mr. M. W. Hunt gave very interest-  
ing data as to what the other plants  
had done and the possibilities open to  
Stayton. He further stated that there  
is no more ideal location for a milk  
condenser than here, also believes the  
time ripe to organize.

J T Kearns believes it the best  
thing that ever came to Stayton, and  
from his conversation with farmers of  
the surrounding country, gave the meet-  
ing their assurance of their hearty  
support.

Mr W L Freese, Banker  
and Mayor said he to was thoroughly  
convinced that this condenser was one  
of the things that would build up the  
community and make money for the  
citizens of Stayton and vicinity.

The meeting adjourned to meet at  
some future date to be announced  
later. There was \$2500 subscribed in  
a few minutes and it is an assured fact  
now that we are to have the best pay-  
ing proposition for our town that is  
available. Marion county folks are  
the kind that do a thing when they  
are assured that it is right. We know  
before next issue we will have glowing  
reports from every section in which a  
committeeman is located.
