The penalty for violating the order is exclusion from the mails. This forces THE MAIL and all other papers to insist that subscriptions be paid during the year.

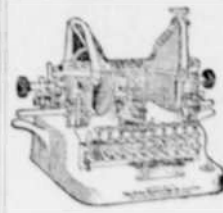

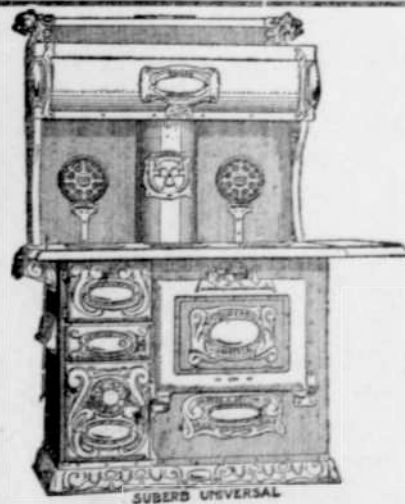

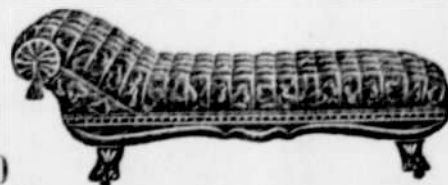
