Greatest Fair State Has Ever Known.

The last day of the 47th annual Oregon State Fair came to a close last evening when a fairly large crowd gathered in the auditorium to listen to the farewell entertainment by McElroy's band, assisted by Mrs. Hallie Parrish Hinges, Miss Lylith Moore, The Oregon Male Quartette, the Trivolas and the Three DeGarros.

Yesterday's crowds at the fair grounds were the smallest of any day in the week, and the visitors took their leisure in examining the exhibits expressing much satisfaction with what they saw. The stock parade yesterday was abandoned because so many of the exhibitors were getting their animals ready for shipment to Portland. Early in the morning the cars began to arrive on the S. P. siding and at 3 o'clock the owners began loading. First came a bunch of race horses and then a number of cattle. After these more racers and then about 40 of the exhibition horses. A special train of forty cars arrived from Portland during the evening and about 11 o'clock started back with forty carloads of race horses and livestock for the Portland show which opens Monday. The balance of the livestock will go out to-day, as well as a number of cars of exhibits. The agent of the S. P. at the Fair Grounds stated yesterday that 82 carloads of stock and exhibits were unloaded at the fair grounds switch last Sunday.

The bee demonstration attracted the most attention of any of the special events of the day, the vicinity of the bee cage being thronged with people both morning and afternoon during the hour or more that each of the demonstrations were in progress. The opportunity to get expert instruction in bee culture was appreciated and numberless questions most of them showing thought and sincere desire for information, were asked and answered. It is hoped that there will be an elevated cage provided next year where more people can see these demonstrations.

There has been much complaint among concessionaires this year because of the increase in prices. Last year the concessions all did a rushing business and made a great deal of money. This year the State Fair board raised the license fee and the ground rent for many kinds of the stands. Notwithstanding the increased prices, the concessionaires flocked to the grounds, led on by the profits made by the fewer number last year. The result is that many have barely made expenses and some have run behind. There were too many for the number of people in attendance.

This, however, can be said. The increase in the number of eating places made it comparatively easy for the crowds to get something to eat, and there were not the long lines waiting at the various restaurants to get their turn at the tables or counters. All the exhibitors express themselves as much pleased with the attendance at their booths and state that the advertising they have received has more than repaid them for the effort and cost of exhibiting, regardless of premiums received. Numerous selection have been made from the various county exhibits by the Alaska-Yukon Pacific commission and will be used as a foundation for the Oregon exhibit at Seattle next year.—Statesman.

Many Visit State Fair.

Last week Stayton and vicinity was almost vacated on account of the State Fair in Salem. There was a great attendance from this place, many of our residents took their tents, therefore enjoyed an outing while visiting the Fair, which without a doubt was the best ever held in this state. There was much interest shown in the stock exhibit. We are proud of the fact that Stayton is among the list of towns that carries a winner. This section is wonderfully well adapted to the raising of fine stock and with such a stimulus as has been shown this year we can rest assured that each year will bring a better State Fair, but let us also hope that we will have a county fair in Stayton before many years.
