It is truly appalling the disregard of the game laws of Oregon by foreign hunters this fall. We have been reliably informed that parties from other states have been and are running deer with dogs in the vicinity of the Little North Fork of the Santiam near Elkhorn.

This disregard for our game laws is to blame for the rapid disappearance of Oregon's game, especially the deer and elk. No true sportsman will take a pack of hounds and put them on trails used by deer for the purpose of remaining on a "stand" to willfully shoot down in cold blood an innocent doe.

We have as many hunters in our section as could be found in a like area of the Beaver state but do they willfully shoot down an innocent doe after it has been chased so long with hounds that the flesh is ruined for domestic use? No! they are men, when they want a deer they go and get one or two according to their family needs, but in a very few years they will have to omit venison from their bill of fare. Why? Because a few people who have absolutely no regard for Oregon game laws are permitted to run deer with hounds.

Voters take this matter up and see to it that you are supplied with deputy game wardens, who will investigate these matters, and if the one chosen does not do it take the

matter in hand and see that some one is put in charge who will enforce the law upon such miscreants.

The Little North Fork of the Santiam hunting woods are famed for the great number of deer taken out of it annually, but let us stop and consider how soon there will be no deer. Such hunters as referred to above are worse than wild animals and as such should be watched.
