THEY KILLED AN ELK

And Also Discovered The Lost Irishman Mine.

A party of six, James Russell, Thomas Neal, and the four Worth brothers, starting from Stayton September 30 made a trip to Packers Gulch on the Quartzville branch of the south Santiam. The general object being to have an outing and the especial purpose being to kill one or more of the big elk that inhabit that section. They returned Monday having been gone 13 days. They report having a good time; that is, it seems good now, though the trip was a hard one, with much more work than play about it, but they got their elk and also two deer. They struck elk sign the third day out, and followed it as far as Crabtree prairie that night. The next morning with five days provisions on their backs they took up the trail again following it up hill and down dale, through thickets and swamps, across canyons and over rugged hills and rocky points that would make a jack rabbits feet stutter, camping where night overtook them, intent only on getting an elk at any cost.

The elk traveled in a circle so that they recrossed their own trail, but on the 5th day about 3 o'clock in the afternoon they caught up with their game in a vine maple thicket, in a swamp just south of Indian prairie, and about five miles east of Snow Peak. There was only one way the elk could get out and that was by going up a ravine or gully. Three of the party took stations at the mouth of the ravine, while two others went around to the upper side, and played dog trying to drive the elk down to those stationed at the outlet, but the animals were too wise and refused to break cover. Then G S and J D Worth made a second drive of the thicket, and succeeded in chasing out a cow elk, which those lying in wait for her shot, putting four 30-30 bullets into her before she fell.

By this time it was dark and the boys made camp. Their provisions were out, but they made a meal on elk meat, which was washed down with cold mountain water, proving both filling and satisfying. The balance of the elk hunt left during the night, and so there was the delights of the hunt in the past, and the doubtful pleasures of many miles of rough trail to be tackled, but it had to be done and was.

It may be thought, that the party accomplished much more than was intended, for while in Packers Gulch they discovered what they supposed to be the "Lost Irishman Mine," for the re-discovery of which a reward of \$5,000 was offered early last summer. They first found a pick sticking in the ground, the handle rotted off, and scratching away the leaves, uncovered a shovel, the handle of which had also rotted off, a drill about four feet long and an old pole ax which they supposed had been used driving the drill, as the eye was sprung.

They brought out some of the ore found near by which is being assayed. Whether they will claim the reward or locate the mine has not been determined, but whatever they may do in this respect, they are all of the opinion that one elk hunt is sufficient for several years, and that beef is just as good and much cheaper.
