Jack London's New Book.
Jack London has just written a book
of 142,000 words entitled "Martin
Eden" THE PACIFIC MONTHLY

of seeing it.

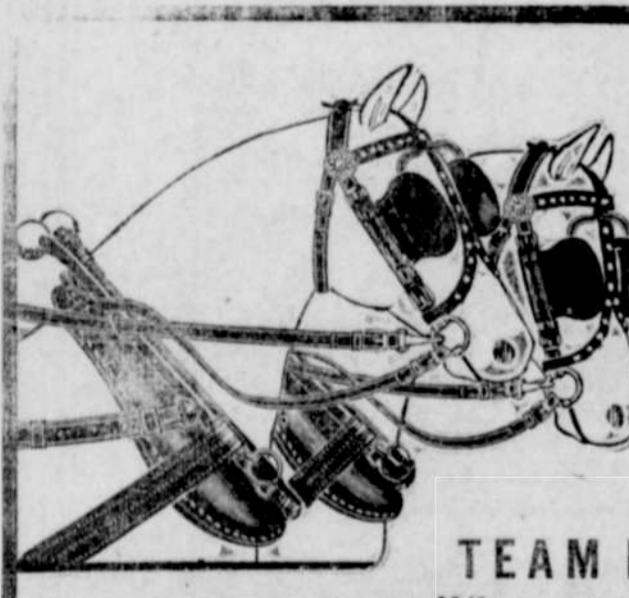

Another Rich Strike.
