Portland, Oregon, November 11th.
Albany is not allowing the people of Portland or the other valley cities and towns to forget the Albany Apple Fair and the dedication of the new Southern Pacific depot on Tuesday, November 10th.

Two of the greatest displays of apples ever made in the Pacific Northwest are attractions for early in December. One will commence at Portland December 1st and continue for three days, when Spokane will take the center of the stage in this same character of entertainment from December 7th to 12th.

The Portland Commercial Club had two great over flow occasions last week. There were more people present Tuesday night to get election returns than at any time since the new building was erected. But the greatest event, both in attendance and importance was the banquet given Friday night to mark the opening of the "North Bank Road," with honored guests including James J. Hill, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Great Northern; Howard Elliot, President of the Northern Pacific; Louis

W. Hill, President of the Great Northern; George P. Harris, President of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy; Francis B. Clarke, President of the Spokane, Portland and Seattle; and other officials of national reputation in the railway and commercial world. A miniature train was part of the decorative scheme of the banquet tables.

DIED.

Mrs. Jane Rossiter died at her home five miles east of Sublimity on November 7th. Cause of death, neuralgia of the heart. She was aged 60 years, 7 months and eight days.

Mrs. Rossiter was of a kind and lovable disposition that endeared her to the whole community in which she lived as well as to her relatives scattered throughout Canada and Oregon. Jane Starrett was born in Brampton, Canada and was married to W. S. Rossiter at the age of twenty. They resided in Canada for a number of years, moving to Oregon in 1879 and has since resided in the community in which she died.

Her husband preceded her 15 years ago, leaving her with a family of small children.

She was buried Nov. 9th at Union Hill cemetery. She was the mother of Chas. Rossiter who is well known here.
