WE, the undersigned, Chairman and Secretary of the District Road Meeting of the legal voters of Road District No. 32, of the County of Marion, State of Oregon, held on the 21st day of November 1908, at the town hall, in the Town of Stayton, Marion county, Oregon.

Would respectfully report that said meeting was called to order and presided over by G Murphy, chairman of said Road District. A motion was duly made and seconded that E D Alexander act as Secretary of the meeting. The motion carried.

The chairman reported that said meeting was called by the Road Supervisor of said District in pursuance to a written petition of three or more freeholders of said Road District asking for the same, by posting three notices as required by law, a copy of which notice and affidavit of time and place of posting same are hereto attached. There were many legal and qualified voters of said district present at the meeting.
