(Continued from last week.) 1-2 mill on the Melama road, 3-4 mill on the Taylor hill, 1-2 mill on the Sublimity road, 1-4 mill on the Aumsville road, 1-4 mill on Whitney and Darby road, 3-4 mill on the West Stayton road, work to consist of grading, grubbing, ditching, macadamizing and crushing rock.

Resolved. That the work to be done on the several roads in the District be as follows: Beginning at the C. W. Thomas place and work to the east line of District No. 32 on the Melama road. Beginning at the bottom of Taylor hill and work east to the west boundary of James Taylor's land. Beginning at Sublimity line and work south on Sublimity road. Beginning at Spaniol mill and work to the railroad on West Stayton road. Beginning at intersection of Aumsville road with Whitney road and Darby road, work said Whitney and Darby road west to District line. Beginning at same place work Aumsville road north west to District line.

APPLES AND AMUSEMENT Spokane Wash., Dec. 3—Apples and amusements will comprise the program of the national apple show which opens here December 7th and continues through the week. Apples will figure in nearly every branch of the big exposition and in every form. The amusement feature will comprise the best list of side shows and vaudeville attractions ever brought to the northwest. Most of the time will be presented at the apple show for the first time on the Pacific Coast.

The vaudeville entertainments will be given in the Washington state armory building adjoining the main exposition hall. Two concerts will be given daily, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. In all, there are 2000 people who attend the show.

Such famous entertainers as the Four Rome Beauties, acrobatic dancers and the Musical Spragullas in their novelty musical act head the list of vaudeville shows. LaTasco, the comedy juggler whose performances have pleased thousands of people all through the eastern states has been brought to Spokane for the national apple show and will give two acts daily. The Booth-Gordon trio is another attraction which will be presented at the apple show in Spokane for the first time in the west.

These daring bicycle performers have thrilled audiences on both sides of the Atlantic by their clever tricks. Other features will be the Tony Riders, a monkey act, the whirling smilettes and the Raymond Duo, a new act which has had much success where given.

One of the chief attractions of the week will be the national apple show band of 40 pieces organized for the occasion from among the best musicians in the three states of Washington, Oregon and Idaho.

Dear Editor:

A few words regarding public health. Typhoid fever and many other infectious fevers are caused by a certain specific germ. This germ gaining admittance into the body will invariably cause a certain train of symptoms to appear in the individual invaded. You all have heard some physician say that Typhoid fever is due to impure water. If you have not heard it you have read it.

The impurities referred to are these germs or bacilli. These minute organisms live and float in the water for an indefinite period of time and maintain their virility. Now you wonder how these germs get into the water. Easy enough I am sure. For instance we will suppose there is a toilet on the bank of the mill race near the woolen mill; and that one of the employees has the germs within his body but not being work (a thing that is quite common with Typhoid fever) until a week or ten days elapse should make use of it. It is hard to imagine that the germs deposited here would find their way, in the fairly pure water of the ditch to the pumping station of the town of Stayton and there be pumped into our water mains thereby polluting our city water supply, rendering it unfit for even bathing purposes. These germs may remain for an indefinite time in the water of the ditch and then become dislodged at any time and imperil the health of those that use it. It is a common thing for children to drink out of the hose and a stranger coming in is compelled to quench his thirst by this mild beverage and therefore it would seem imperative that we keep unnecessary filth from the ditch from which the city water is obtained. Not only by drinking this polluted water would we be endangered but by the washing of vegetables with this same water they could be easily deposited on them and if eaten raw would get in their work of producing disease in any one that eat them. These matters should demand attention from our town officials.

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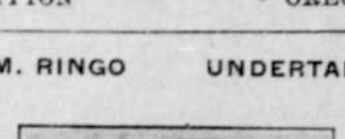
