ADDITION TO SCHOOL

Proposition to Build Addition 24x46 Carries at Special Election.—Going Up at Once.

At a special election held on June 25th it was decided to bond the Stayton school district for \$2,000 to raise money with which build an addition 24x46 on the west side of the present school building. The addition will be two stories in height and will give all departments more room, which is greatly needed. Clerk J. R. Gardner of the school board is sending all the papers covering the election, to an attorney for his opinion as to the legality of the procedure, and if everything is found to be regular, work on the addition will commence at once.

The school board is composed of W. A. Wright, H. N. Huntley and L. S. Lamberti.

STAYTON IS READY FOR CELEBRATION

All Arrangements Complete for Observance of Nation's Birthday.—Col. Hofer to be the Orator of the Day.

Everything is in readiness for the greatest Fourth of July celebration in the history of Stayton. Col. E. Hofer of Salem, an energetic, original and successful newspaper man, will be the speaker of the day and no doubt will have many things to say that will

be well worth hearing. The program of the day includes a grand parade at 10 a. m., followed by program of music and addresses including address of the day by Col. Hofer, and games and athletics in the afternoon. Stayton and Seio will cross bats for a purse of \$30. Among the other amusements to take place after the ball game, will be a free for all horse race, purse \$15; Pony race, \$5; Foot race, free for all, \$5;

The Odd Fellows temple will be 50x100, two stories high, the outside walls constructed of re-inforced concrete. The ground floor will be left in one room at present but may be divided into two stores later. The entire second floor will be devoted to lodge purposes, including lodge room, kitchen, anteroom, ect. The building will cost between \$7,000 and \$8000.

DELAYED BY STRIKE

Labor Trouble in Portland Holds up Work on Odd Fellows' Temple in Stayton.

Work on the two new concrete business blocks has been considerably delayed by the strike of the steel workers in Portland. Some of the beams ordered for the Odd Fellows building a month ago have not yet arrived and it was found necessary to lay off the masons employed on the job, two or three days ago, because the mason work could not proceed farther without the steel for re-inforcements. The partitions are now being placed in position on the second floor and it is hoped the steel will arrive by the time the carpenter work is finished.

The W. E. Thomas & Son building, on Third street, will be two stories, 25x100. The Thomas Grocery will occupy the ground floor and the second story will be used for lodge or office purposes. The building work is in charge of Chas. Druck, recently from Chicago, and is going ahead rapidly. The cost will be about \$6,000.

Both new buildings will be complete about September first. There are several other building projects in view, including an addition to the Stayton Mail building.

CHERRY FAIR NEXT

Salem's Big Fruit Show and Carnival will be Held Next Week, July 7th, 8th and 9th.

Salem's Fifth Annual Cherry Fair will be held next Thursday, Friday and Saturday, July 7, 8 and 9. Elaborate preparations have been made for this event, which promises to be the best from every standpoint that the Cherry City people have attempted. There will be two big parades, one on Thursday and the other on Saturday. The latter is to be a comic parade and rumors of floats rich and rare have been floating about the Capital Town for some weeks. On Friday there will be a meeting of the Willamette Valley Apple Growers' Association. Every afternoon during the fair there will be lectures on fruit problems by experts from O. A. C. and elsewhere. Liberal prizes will be given for the best decorated floats, automobiles and carriages. Prizes of \$15 and \$10 have been offered for the best decorated store windows.

An exciting election for queen has been on for two or three weeks and the result is still in doubt.

The pavilion in which the cherries, berries and flowers will be shown, will be located on High street between State and Court.
