Mrs. Roands, the temperance lecturer, spoke in Gates Sunday to a well filled house.

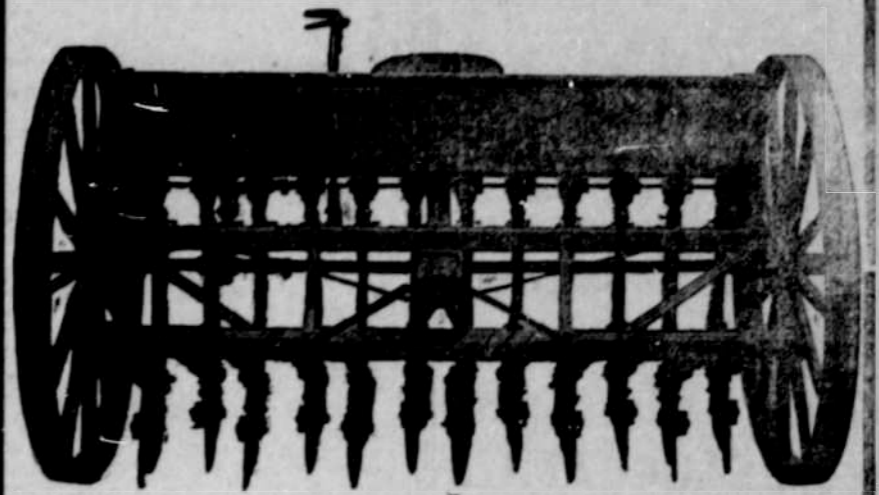
Babe Dinamore has been quite ill but is fast recovering.

C. A. Bevier went to Quartzville for a few days outing.

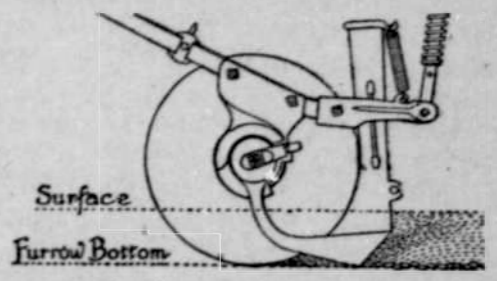
