the bridge crew were at once set to work on a new ferry. This craft will be 46x16 feet, and will require several days to be put in shape for use. In the meanwhile a small rowboat is doing service between the two counties.

This is the steenth time this spring that Stayton has been cut off from Lion, and it is not a pleasant situation. It is to be hoped that the speedy erection of a temporary bridge will be possible.

MANY HOMESTEADERS EXPECTED THIS YEAR

Land officers report a great deal of inquiry for vacant land in this state and it is expected that 1912 will be notable for the large areas of the Government domain to be taken by settlers. The change in the land laws, allowing a residence of three years on a homestead preliminary to making proof, which has passed both houses of Congress and waits only the signature of the President, is making public lands more attractive than ever before to the settler.

STATE BANK DEPOSITS MAKE LARGE INCREASE

Banks of the state continue to grow, reflecting the continued prosperity of all Oregon. According to the report of Will Wright, superintendent of banks, deposits have increased from \$114,339,475, on March 7, 1911, to \$127,136,997 on April 18 of this year, a gain of \$12,797,524, or more than a million dollars a month during the year.

Staining Wood Dark Hues.
The appearance of walnut may be given to white woods by painting or sponging them with a concentrated warm solution of permanganate of potassa. The effect is different on different kinds of timber, some becoming stained very rapidly, others requiring more time for this result. The permanganate is decomposed by the woody fiber. Brown peroxide of manganese is precipitated, which is afterward removed by washing with water. The wood, when dry, may be varnished and will be found to resemble very closely the naturally dark woods.—Harper's Magazine.
