STAYTON SCHOOL OPENS NEXT MONDAY

The Stayton public school will reopen on Monday, September 15, for the 1912-13 year. Miss Nora Crabtree has been selected as principal by the school board, while G. C. Nance of Aumsville will wield the birch over grades 6 and 7. The 4th and 5th grades will be taught by Miss Ida Mack of Salem, and Mrs. Pratt of Aumsville will conduct the primary room. There seems to be some doubt, up to today, just who will teach the 2d and 3d grades, although the place has been offered to Miss Miriam Hannan of Leavenworth, Washington. When last interviewed, the clerk, J. R. Gardner, stated that Miss Hannan had not yet accepted the position, although he thought it very probable that she would before Monday.

Miss Crabtree and Miss Mack need no introduction to Stayton people, as both taught here last year, and Miss Crabtree is a resident of this city. Mr. Nance taught near Kingston last year, while Mrs. Pratt is an experienced Marion county teacher. Miss Hannan comes well recommended.

It is regrettable that Stayton does not have an approved high school, as a number of pupils are leaving here this year to attend at other places, and several families have signified their willingness to move to Stayton if an adequate high school were conducted here. However, it is to be hoped that this will be overcome before this time next year.
