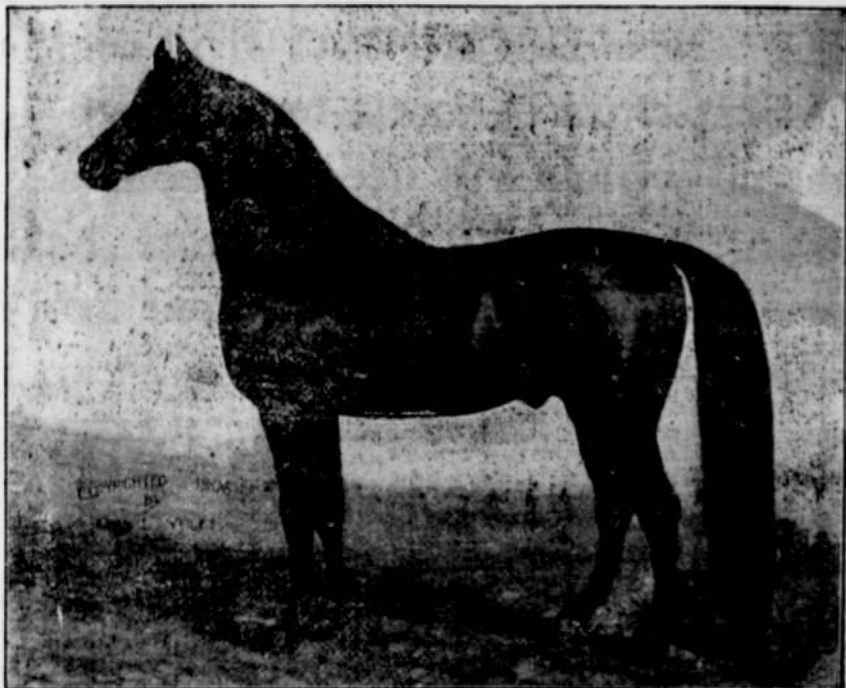

### WORK AT EXPOSITION
