ful city on Tuesday. The loss of life and property as yet can only be estimated. Some reports claim that 5000 have perished and over 30,000 are homeless. Fire and famine are adding to the horrors of both storms, while the cold weather prevailing will claim many more victims of death by exposure.

Almost every city in the United States is sending telegrams of condolence and help. It will be weeks before a real estimate of the death and destruction can be made, meanwhile our readers should watch carefully the lists in the daily papers for the record of their friends and relatives in the East.

**Later Reports**

Later reports add fire to flood and starvation in the Ohio and Indiana cities. It is feared that the grand total of lives lost will even exceed the 10,000 estimate, while the property loss will reach over \$100,000,000.

Congress has appropriated \$500,000 for the relief of the sufferers.
