SOUTHERN PACIFIC CO. TO SPEND MILLIONS

The Southern Pacific Company will spend millions on its Oregon lines during the next two years, according to a formal statement of planned improvements that has been submitted to the California railroad commission. The company asks for permission to issue bonds to the amount of \$30,000,000 and gives as a reason for the request the number of heavy contemplated investments in this state. Among these are: Electrification of lines in the Willamette Valley; reconstruction of the Sheridan-Willamina railroad at a cost of \$2,501,880; Corvallis and Eastern R. R., \$270,580; Pacific Railroad & Navigation Co., \$134,540; Salem, Falls City & Western, \$68,680.

PROVISIONS OF THE NEW GAME LAW

Under the provisions of the new game law, which went into effect June 3, no retail dealer will be allowed to sell a pistol to anyone unless the person has a permit to buy, signed by the municipal judge, city recorder, county judge or a justice of the peace. And in securing such a permit the applicant must produce an affidavit signed by at least two persons certifying to the character of the applicant. No alien or person not a citizen of the United States will be allowed a hunting license unless he can show that he holds a gun license, to obviate this difficulty, however, if the alien has taken out first naturalization papers, he may be permitted to obtain a hunting license the same as any other citizen by paying the fee of \$1.
