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THE EVOLUTION OF TROUSERS

It is a far cry from the crinoline of the 60s to the peg-top skirt of these days. Much farther than from the present style to the bifurcated garment heretofore claimed exclusively by the men, yclept trousers. Recently there met in New York representatives from 34 states, of the National Ladies' Tailoring and Dressmaking Association, and the principal subject of discussion was ladies' skirts. These delegates will decide what the woman shall wear, and so far as skirts are concerned, they have already decided. The skirts are to be as badly hobbled as ever, but they are to be split up in front instead of the side, and some of them at least up the back.

There are already a few of these visible in Salem and they certainly attract much attention, and cause some not very flattering remarks concerning the taste of the wearers and also as to the discretion of the same. The latest are split up the front to about the knee, and have a reversed decollete effect aft. When the dainty wearer trips along, the skirt gathers clingingly and lovingly about the calves impartially showing first one and then the other, or their shape, about as thoroughly as though there were no skirt at all. This is along the line of evolution, and is rapidly nearing the trouser stage. When the skirt is split far enough, and that will not be much more or farther than the present style, all that will be required to complete the metamorphosis, and convert the skirt into the genuine male garment is to sew the back and front edges of the splits together and the trousers are there. The new skirt is built baggy amidships so the wearers can sit, if they are careful, without danger of hearing anything tear. In some of the suits the splits are filled with netting corresponding in color with the skirt; in others they open to show a petticoat, the color of the trimming of the gown. If to attract attention is the object in fashioning feminine wear, then the present style is a phenomenal success. They are about as graceful as a rag on a kid's sore toe, but they are charmingly frank, and like crystal, most do show the things they most should hide.

Anyway, the male of these days can accumulate a fund of information as to the construction of the hull and running gears of the modern woman that was denied to his unfortunate ancestors. There is little left for guesswork, for the sails and furnishings of the craft feminine, conceal but little, and the design is visible from stem to keelson, from forefoot to rudderpost and bowsprit to spanker boom.

However, the dear creatures like it, and saints forbid that mere man should butt in and object, where angels fear to tread. Anyway it is none of our business, and this is only mentioned as a matter of news, and information, and not in the way of criticism; for as far as the ladies go, we like them all regardless of what kind of skirts they wear. We go even further than this and will continue to admire them even should they invade the realm of trousers. It must not be overlooked, though, that the new skirt is provided with a hip pocket abaft the beam on the starboard side, presumably for carrying a gun; and to retain some of the elements of femininity, there is another similar pocket on the port side for a powder outfit.—Capital Journal.
