NOTICE!

Business houses are subject to a fine of \$100. after July 3, of this year, 1913.

Under a Law passed by the Oregon Legislature at the last session, every person or persons, firm or corporation doing business in the State of Oregon under any name, style or designation other than the true name or names of all the persons interested in such business are required to file a statement with the county clerk, under oath, setting forth the true name or names of all persons engaged in any business conducted under any name other than the true name or names of all persons interested therein.

The Law requires the above statement to be filed within thirty days from the date the act becomes a Law which is June 3. Any person failing to file any such statement shall be subject to a fine of \$100.00 and shall be deprived of the right to bring an action in any court within the State of Oregon.
