HEAVY VOTE POLLED AT CITY ELECTION

A remarkably heavy vote was polled at the city election Monday, despite the fact that but little interest was being manifested on the streets in the past few days.

Three-hundred-eighty-seven citizens registered their choice. Of these Dr. H. A. Beauchamp received 219 and G. W. Murphy 160 for mayor; J. R. Gardner 269, G. L. Brown 191, H. N. Huntly 186 and C. D. Stayton 166 for councilmen; J. B. Grier 323 for recorder, Henry Smith 189, T. C. Crabtree 184 for marshal; and C. A. Luthy 353 for treasurer.

The re-election of Dr. Beauchamp as mayor, stamps the popular approval on his administration for the past two years, and shows that the citizens have confidence in him to oversee the affairs of the town for the next two.

The closest race was between the candidates for marshal, Smith winning with a margin of five votes.

The election is over and Christmas is coming, why not get together and form a Commercial body of some sort in order to be prepared for the influx of people to the Coast in the next two years.

Stayton's prospects look very good if a little good hard boosting is done. Why not be a booster?

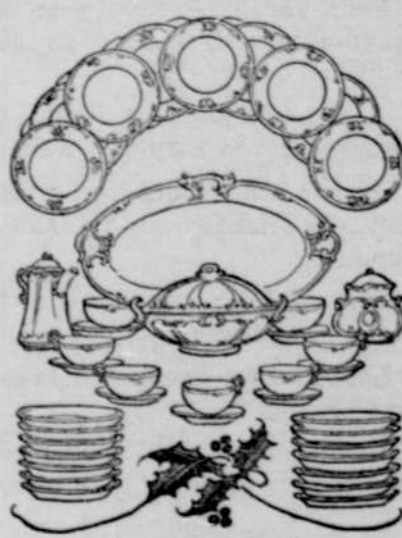
