### UMATILLA PROJECT STARTED

Secretary of Interior Orders Operations on West Extension at Once.

Pendleton .- H. D. Newell, engineer in charge of the Umatilla project at Hermiston, received orders by telegraph from Secretary of the Interior Lane to begin operations on the west extension of that project immediately. As this order has been eagerly awaited, no time was lost, and within one hour after the message was received a crew of men were busy locating the first construction camp. This will be about two miles west of Hermiston.

The 70,000 acres contained in the west extension will be reclaimed by units. There are 10,000 acres in the first unit. The principal part of the work will be the construction of the diversion dam across the Umatilla river, making a reservoir of the river valley. This dam will be located two miles west of Hermiston. Following the completion of the first unit, a second dam will be built across the large part of the Umatilla meadows into a reservoir.

### W. J. Leaton is Sentenced.

Marshfield .- William J. Leaton, convicted of the theft of \$3085 of street funds of the little town of East Side, near here, while city recorder there, was sentenced to from one to 15 years in state prison and to pay a fine of \$6170. The fine is \$2 for every dollar he stole.
