For the first time since loganberry culture has become a fixed industry in the Willamette Valley, the fruit is being shipped to the East in large quantities. During the season 25 carloads will be shipped to Chicago, St. Louis, Lincoln, Nebr., Kansas City, and Denver. These shipments will consist of fresh fruit and will not include the great shipments of dried berries which will be made later.
