MRS. S. H. HELTZEL SUCCUMBS TO PNEUMONIA

Wife of Attorney S. H. Helzel of this City Buried in I.O.O.F. Cemetery Today

Mrs. S. H. Helzel of this city died last Tuesday of pneumonia after an illness of only three days. Mrs. Helzel was taken ill suddenly Saturday afternoon and her condition although serious was not deemed alarming until Monday. Dr. H. A. Beauchamp attending physician then called Dr. W. B. Morse of Salem in consultation.

Realizing her condition, everything possible to medical skill was resorted to by her physicians and those attending her. She seemed to be improving Tuesday morning and conditions were more favorable for her recovery, however, she was unable to withstand the attack, and passed away at 11:20 o'clock Tuesday night.

Mrs. Helzel was born at Bristow, Iowa, Sept. 12, 1887. She moved to Oregon with her parents in 1900. After her high school course she studied music at Willamette University where she met Mr. Helzel. The friendship culminated in marriage at the home of her parents in Portland, Oregon, on Christmas Eve 1911. They came at once to Stayton where Mr. Helzel was practicing law, and have since resided here.

She was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church since a child and took an active part in Sunday school and Epworth League work. She was a good musician and had a sweet voice. She was a kind and loving wife and mother and took pleasure in her home life. She leaves surviving her, her husband and little boy two years old. Her father F. K. Spalding, her mother Nellie M. Spalding, and younger brother F. Merrick Spalding now residing at Sunnyside, Wash., an older brother Harry K. Spalding, all of whom were here and attended the funeral services. The services were held at the M. E. Church and were conducted by the Rev. Richard Hocking of Stayton.

The wheat crop is not quite as good as was expected on account of the dry spell in June and July not filling out the kernels, although the straw was very long. The oat crop will not average as well as the wheat for the same reason.

With a good price in sight, however, the farmer will get almost as much as usual for his crop.

The hop crop is coming along nicely and the yield promises to be almost up to the average.

GAME WARDEN SENDS OUT WARNING

Salem, Ore., Aug. 18.—State Game Warden Evans has notified all his deputy gardens that Governor West has issued a proclamation closing the deer season until September 1, and instructing them to warn all hunters to leave the forests. The State Game Warden declared that he would be lenient with hunters who had violated the proclamation prior to receiving notice of it being in effect. In such cases there would be no prosecutions, he declared, but in all cases where violators occur after the hunter received notice of the proclamation the law will be fully enforced. The executive closed the season because it was apparent that a number of the present forest fires originated from hunters' campfires. He figures that by September 1 there will be a rainfall sufficient to relieve the situation. Under the law the season closes November 1.
