#### Portland.

Portland - There was a big run of all kinds of stock at the North Portland yards. The result on prices was a decline of a quarter on hogs and a weaker feeling in the cattle market.

Sheep held firm. The best price obtainable in the cattle market for steers was \$7.15, only one load going at that figure. Five OLMES BUSINESS COLLEGE loads were sold at \$7 and two at \$7.05.

The bulk of sales were at \$6.50 and \$7. Good cows sold from \$5.60 to \$6, and calves at \$8. In the hog market the top price was \$9.25, as against a \$9.50 market

throughout most of last week. The larger part of the mutton transactions were in lambs, most of which brought \$6. Ewes sold readily at \$3.35, wethers at \$5 and yearlings at the same price.






