FARMER CANDIDATE LIKED

Democratic Candidate For State Senate
Will Get Strong Vote In Stayton
Precinct

Few men whose names will appear on the official ballot of Marion county are better or more favorably known than W. H. Downing, the Democratic candidate for state senator. He is a farmer and lives at Sublimity, where he was born. For a number of years he was engaged in business in Salem, and both in the city and on the farm he has led a useful and active life, and but few men are better acquainted with Marion county as a whole than he is. FORMER STAYTON RESIDENT DIES

Grace Pearl Apple was born in Howard county Indiana, August 9, 1885, and died at her home in Twickenham, Oregon, October 23, 1914.

Twenty-three years ago she came with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Apple, to Oregon. Her early education was obtained at Stayton, near where her parents still reside. From there she went to Salem, where she attended college. In this as in everything she undertook her sunny disposition and perseverance enabled her to make her work a success.

In November 1909 she was married to Henry D. Keys of Wheeler county. This union was blessed with two children, Elizabeth Viola aged four and William Zachary aged two.

A loving daughter, a kind and devoted wife and mother, her death brings sorrow to many but "They mourn not as those who have no hope."

The funeral was October 26, at the Christian Church in Stayton and interment was in the Stayton cemetery. Rev. H. E. Rossell officiating.

MARION COUNTY REPUBLICANS MEET

COUNTY TICKET HAS RALLY

Jas. G. Heltzel Represented the State and
National Ticket—Much Enthusiasm at
His Remarks

Republican Candidates for the state legislature from Marion County appeared in a body at the Opera House Monday evening and treated the people of Stayton and vicinity to a number of excellent speeches. Each candidate expressed his views as to the best way of securing an economical administration of the business of the state.

Jas. G. Heltzel of Salem spoke in behalf of the State and National ticket. He first outlined the fundamental differences between the democratic and republican theories and policies of conducting the National government in the interest of the greatest number of people. He spoke very highly of President Wilson and some of the work he has accomplished, but made it very clear that it is a matter of common knowledge that we have enjoyed under republican administrations the greatest prosperity the nation ever had, and that we have suffered a business depression under every democratic administration that has been in power. Mr. Heltzel indicated that the whole trouble lay in the difference between the two theories of government as applied in actual practice.

Mr. Heltzel spoke very highly of Hon. R. A. Booth, candidate for U. S. Senator. He stated that the high esteem in which he is held by his neighbors, friends and employees, his altruistic methods of business, his capabilities as a statesman, and the fact that he is a champion of those republican doctrines which have always produced happiness, comfort and prosperity to the American people was sufficient recommendation for his election. He also stated that the successful

career of Hon. W. C. Hawley as a member of Congress was sufficient reason to keep him at his post in Washington.

In speaking of the state ticket he stated that Dr. James Withycombe was by far the most qualified candidate for governor that the people of the state of Oregon has ever had. When Dr. Withycombe's name was mentioned as the former's governor, there was a round of applause. Mr. Heltzel spoke at considerable length upon the extravagance that has grown up around the State House during the twelve years of democratic rule; he pointed out that only a republican governor could make the general clean up that is necessary. The speaker pointed out Dr. Withycombe's policy of retrenchment and economy, his advocacy of the single item veto; that he has not resorted to throwing mud; that he has always will continue to how to the line. That Dr. Withycombe is really and truly admired by his democratic opponents even though the Oregon Journal refuses to say a word about it.

Judges Laurence T. Harris and Henry L. Benson, Republican Candidates for the Supreme Court also received special mention. Everybody seemed to enjoy the meeting and it seemed to be the consensus of opinion that Oregon has some substantial candidates for public office.
