**INTERNAL REVENUE
TAXES ARE NOW DUE**

All Internal Revenue Taxes or "War
Taxes" as they are properly called are
due and must be paid by December 1st
1914, or suffer an additional tax of
50%.

Those affected in Stayton are: Banks,
\$1.00 per \$1000 capital and surplus;
Theatres, \$25.00; Billiard halls, \$5.00
per table; Tobacco retailers, over \$200
per year, \$4.80.

Newspapers will also be charged ad-
ditional postage. A copy of the law
is posted in the postoffice.

**"CITIZENS" TICKET IS PUT
UP MONDAY NIGHT**

At a mass meeting called Monday
night, the Citizen's party, under the
direction of Geo. Keech, who was
elected chairman, put up a strong tick-
et.

W. R. Richardson, cashier of the
Stayton State Bank, and S.L. Stewart,
cashier of the Farmers & Merchants
Bank were the nominees for council-
men.

There was no contest on these places
and the rules were suspended and the
nominations made unanimous.

J. B. Grier was nominated in the
same manner, as but one name was be-
fore the house, for recorder.

Two names were placed before the
meeting for marshal; Henry Smigh and
John Downing. A ballot was taken
and the result as announced by the
secretary, E. M. Olmsted, was: Smith
35, Downing 26. Henry Smith was
duly announced as candidate for mar-
shal on the Citizen's ticket.

Both candidates before being voted
upon made the statement that if elect-
ed they would abide by the decision of
the city council if the additional bur-
den of street commissioner and water
commissioner were required of them.

It took quite a little time to get a
nominee for city treasurer but finally
G. C. Eksman was nominated by unan-
imous vote. This filled the ticket and
after the appointment of J. T. Kearns,
Jos. Fisher and L. A. Thomas as com-
mitteemen for the coming year, the
meeting adjourned.
