DIED AT PLEASANT HILL

Word has just been received that J.
J. Hardin, a brother-in-law of Geo. and

home in Pleasant Hill Tuesday.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY

"Not guilty" was the plea entered
before Judge Kelly by Mrs. Nevada
Clark Grier, who is charged with the
murder of her husband on November
14, through her attorney, Mark Weather-
ford. Mrs. Grier was arranged Sat-
urday with George Solomon, who was
indicted jointly with her, on a second
degree charge, and was given until
Monday morning at 10 o'clock to plead.
Solomon entered a plea of "not guilty"
Saturday, says the Albany Herald.

Judge Kelly set the case for trial for
Friday at 9 o'clock a. m., at which
time a jury will be drawn. The jury
will go to Mill City to view the scene
of the shooting Monday of next week
and the trial will open Tuesday morn-
ing at 9 o'clock a. m. and that not over
two days will be taken to try it.

VERDICT FOR TRUSTEE

A verdict in favor of D. G. Drager,
trustee in bankruptcy of the Stayton
Woolen Mills company, in his suit
against S. Phillipi, E. D. Phillipi and
the Stayton Water Power Company
was given yesterday by Judge Gallo-
way in the circuit court. The conclu-
sions in the case declare the woolen
mills company to be owner of fifteen
shares of stock in the water company,
which E. D. Phillipi was ordered to
transfer to Drager, and restrains S.
Phillipi and E. D. Phillipi from own-
ership of the shares and also restrains
the water company from recognizing
the latter as the owners. —Statesman.
