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DEVELOPMENT LEAGUE MET MONDAY NIGHT

The Stayton Development League met in the Mail office Monday night and several interesting subjects came up, among which was the appointment of a committee of one to set together with the Sublimity Commercial Club in an interview with the officials of the new electric line that has built into Mt. Angel. Geo. Keech was appointed, who will confer with W. H. Downing, the Sublimity committee.

It is expected that Mr. Keech will have a report ready during some time in the holidays, when the League is planning to give a supper and invite in the business men of Stayton, who do not belong.

Another subject of interest was proposed by Prof. Gaunt, who with two other members of the League, are to secure a series of lectures by men from the State University. These lectures will be free and will only cost us the expense of the hall. They will be on a line of civic improvement or any other line the committee may select. It is quite probable that the first lecture will be given in January, and every two weeks thereafter, if the people respond with their support. Announcements will be made later.

DIED AT SILVERTON

William Eisenhart, brother of Christopher Eisenhart of Stayton, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. C. L. Page, at Silvertown on Monday, December 7.

Mr. Eisenhart was 80 years of age at the time of his death and had lived in Marion County since the early 50's. He was buried in the Silvertown cemetery.

MISCREANT SHOOTS AT TWO LITTLE GIRLS

Last Sunday evening a few minutes before six o'clock, while O. V. Myers, two little girls were standing in the north east door of their house, about a mile northeast of town, three shots were fired at, presumably the lantern which one of the little girls carried in her hand. One of the shots hit just above the door jamb, another hit the barn, while the other missed entirely. The little girls had gone out after some ice cream that had been left outside in the freezer when the shots were fired, and Mr. Myers was in the wood shed at the time.

Mr. Myers dug out one of the bullets and undoubtedly it was fired from a .22. Considerable mystery surrounds the episode, as there was no occasion for anything of this kind, nor had the family had trouble of any kind with anyone, to Mr. Myers knowledge.

It is to be hoped that the miscreant will be apprehended, as it is a serious thing to shoot at people in their own homes, even if they are not injured.
