FIRST SKATING FOR MANY, MANY YEARS

The Oldest Inhabitant has already remarked that he "never saw it so cold before." The ice in some places is between four and five inches thick, and the rose bushes that were in bloom before the "snap" have curled up and look thoroughly disgusted with the Nebraska-Iowa brand of weather.

Some of the farmers are fearful for the safety of the fall wheat, as the soil here is given to much heaving and twisting when frozen.

The water system has been stopped several times on account of ice, and the laterals, where too near the top of the ground, are frozen in many places. The electric plant has also been considerably bothered with ice accumulating and cutting down the necessary supply to the water wheel.

To an Easterner the cold weather has been just nice winter weather, with the thermometer keeping steady a few degrees below freezing, but to the Western raised man it seems "real



Superb Venetian Court of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco, 1915



Byzantine architectural style, are shown in the two Venetian courts of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition at San Francisco in 1915. These courts are the connecting links in the Exposition scheme of courts, but they are to have a type of beauty not found elsewhere on the grounds.

One of the Venetian courts connects the Court of the Four Seasons with the Court of the Universe, and the other connects the Court of the Universe with the Court of Abundance. The first one named is shown above. Every bit of the interior of the courts is a part of a color scheme that includes all of the Exposition colors. Since this photograph was taken the shrubs and flowering plants have been placed on all sides of the central paths, and their colors are in harmony with every pigment used in the remainder of the court.

MRS. VADA GRIER IS ACQUITTED OF MURDER

Mrs. Vada Grier was acquitted of the murder of her husband Frank Grier, at Potter's Mill near Mill City, November 14th, by a jury in the circuit court of Linn County last Thursday at 11:45 o'clock P. M., after deliberating for over eight hours. The verdict was a surprise to many who had waited for hours in the court room to hear their report. The jury was selected on Friday Dec. 11th, and went to view the effect. premises where the tragedy took place on the following Monday. The trial proper began at 9:00 o'clock A. M. on Tuesday the 15th and lasted for the greater part of three days. The trial was of considerable interest to residents of Stayton for the reason that the deceased was well known here, his father and mother being residents of Stayton. According to the testimony of two eye witnesses Grier was shot that it is a good investment. without a word of warning. They stated on the witness stand that their first knowledge of the presence of Mrs. Grier was when they heard the report of her gun and saw Grier throw his hand to his side and run. Their testimony was coroborated by another witness who testified that she heard the shots and saw Mrs. Grier running along the west side of a rail fence toward a gate leading into where Grier was shot, However, according to the testimony of Mrs. Grier, she shot in self defense. She stated that she was on the east side of the fence near where Grier and one of the witnesses for the state were standing.
