FIRE IN NORTH END ON TUESDAY NIGHT

A small but extremely vigorous fire started in the woodshed at the Glover home on Tuesday evening about 8 o'clock. A load of excelsior wood together with a bale of excelsior had been unloaded there, and Miss Rae Glover had been out some time before and had lit a wisp of the inflammable stuff to enable her to get an armful of wood. It is supposed that a spark from her improvised torch had fallen in the wood unnoticed by her.

About two hours later on looking out of the house Rae discovered that the whole interior of the shed was a mass of seething flames. Immediately she gave the alarm to the neighbors, and Misses Gladys and Rae Glover together with Edith and Dot Olmsted quickly formed a bucket brigade and after fifteen minutes of desperate fire fighting the flames were subdued.
