## INDUSTRIAL NEWS OF THE WHOLE STATE

Athens is still pushing for a cannery. Marshfield is to have a new state bank.

Baker has organized a county humane society.

Baker is shipping point for the warehousing industry.

Florence—Shipping moss becoming a big industry here.

Bandon spent \$70,000 for sewer and street work in 1914.

Eugene cannery took 2,000,000 lbs. fruit from growers.

Salem is to have a state institution for crippled children.

One firm has shipped out 90 carloads of Hood River apples.

Reported contract let for railroad from Salem to Stayton.

Cottage grove Manufacturing Co. has resumed operations.

Burns—The J. C. Turney oil well near here is down 2130 feet.

Haines—J. F. O'Bryant will erect a 60 by 100 public hall and theatre.

Tillamook—\$20,000 contract for dyking let at mouth of Wilson river.

Railroad economies compel cutting out all advertising folders for western states.

The Oregon Mill & Grain Co. at Baker will establish a flouring mill at Haines.

Couch and Shattuck schools at Portland put in Fess oil burners to cost \$160,000.

Fort Rock-Cougar Valley is to be supplied with telephone service at \$15 per share.

Mable-Sawmills here will operate Feb. 1, with prospects for \$2.00 raise in lumber.

It is believed that the legislature will cut out all expensive junketing trips this season.

Siuslaw Port Commission has authorized sale of \$100,000 bonds for harbor improvement.

The Multnomah delegation will ask the legislature for a \$1,000,000 state highway fund.

The California-Oregon Power Co. plant that burned at Ashland is being rebuilt at a cost of \$10,000.

Jacksonville—A placer mine a quarter of a mile east, at a depth of 43 feet is panning great quantities of gold.

Portland mining men will build a gold quartz mill on the Deschutes near Terabonne to be running by May 1st.

Ontario—D. M. Taggart has invented a single-tree of ten times ordinary strength and will manufacture same here.

The opening week of the legislature was spent talking economy at an expense of \$3000 per day in lieu of practicing any.

Last half of December west coast points shipped 24,000,000 feet of lumber to San Francisco. Coos Bay sent 9,000,000 feet.

Baker Herald—The state legislature has a few problems worth considering. If they handle these as they should the public will allow them to pass up the others.

After being closed down for two months, the three shingle mills operated by the L. B. Menefee Lumber Co. in the Columbia River district will start up January 18.

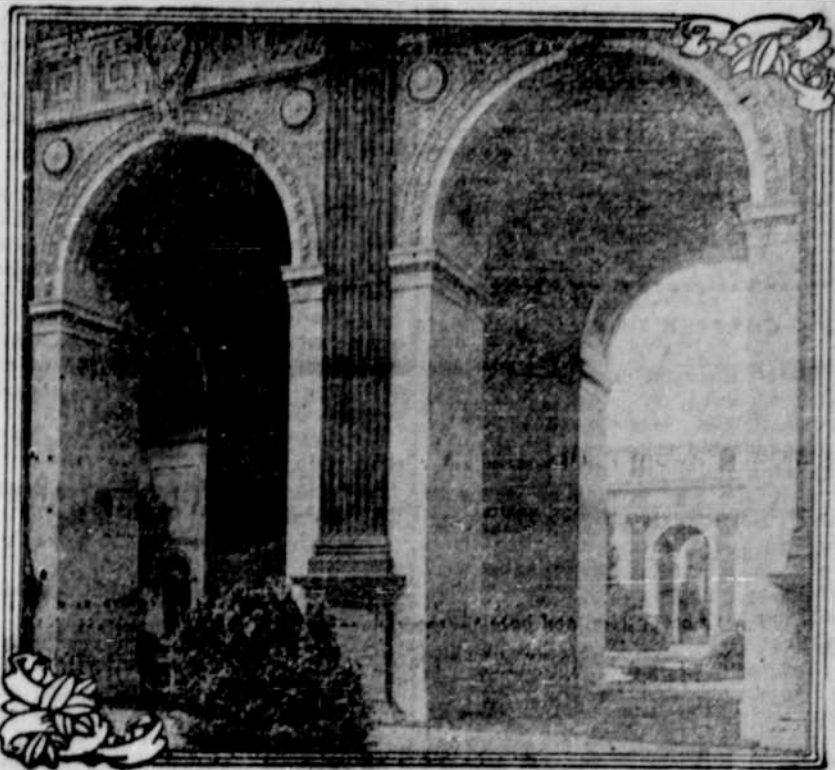
The ovation given Governor Withycombe at his inauguration will be forgotten compared to the one he will receive if he unloads a million dollars a year off the taxpayers.

A campaign is being conducted to cut out at least half a million dollars of extravagance in the administration of the state government and another half million dollars wasteful expenditure by the legislature.

A reform bill that would reduce administration costs in higher education is the One-Board plan for higher educational institutions. To get rid of duplications and secure centralization and business administration is the laudable purpose of this measure.

## Lofty Colonnades of the Superb Court of the Four Seasons, Panama-Pacific International Exposition, San Francisco, 1915



THIS photograph faintly portrays the beauty of the arches that stand between the Court of the Four Seasons and the Western Venetian Court. While it truly presents the attractiveness of the architecture, it cannot even hint at the beauty of color tones.

The pillars shown in this photograph are of verd antique bronze, the background of imitation Travertine is of ochre hue more than half the height of the arch, and the upper portion is of Pompeian red, with touches of orange and copper green in the ornamentation.

Inside the arches the ceilings are of cerulean blue, and bas-relief in white shows scenes typical of the seasons. The square wall surface at the left of the picture shows where one of many mural paintings will be placed.

Looking through the arch, a part of the Court of the Four Seasons may be seen. Closer inspection shows a vase from Spenser and below it the signs of the Zodiac.

The world is to be given something new in the system of courts at the 1915 Exposition, and each one is to be a revelation in modern construction. The Exposition will open at San Francisco on Feb. 20, 1915.
