The Hull of a Dreadnought.
An amazing amount of material goes to the making of a 22,000 ton battleship. Into the hull alone enter some 9,800 tons of steel and iron, an amount more than equal to the whole of the material from keel to fighting tops in many of the pre-Dreadnought war vessels. Of this amount of material over 6,000 tons is steel plating, 2,850 tons is for shapes, channeling and angle pieces; the weight of the rivets used exceeds 500 tons, these rivets ranging in diameter from three-eighths of an inch to one and one-half inches, and there are over 400 tons of specially shaped steel castings, ranging in weight from two to eighteen tons each. These figures include nothing for gun mounting or special armoring, but are for the mere construction of the bare hull alone.—London Express.

London, Ex-Watering Place.
