## AVAITOR DEKOR WILL GIVE AN EXHIBITION AT CHERRY FAIR

Visitors at the Salem Cherry fair held July 2 and 3, and with which is combined a real old fashioned Fourth of July celebration, will have an unusual treat in seeing Fred DeKor, one of the best known and most spectacular bird men in the country. DeKor will fly from the Fair Grounds at Salem, on the afternoon of July 3; he calls himself the "Dare Devil of the Air", and by all accounts lives up to his reputation thoroughly.

Glider, dips and flops are among the least showy of DeKor's stunts in the air. The famous "loop the loop" is performed, as well as spiral and zig-zag flights. Flying upside down he skims through the air with swiftness like smoothness and speed. His exhibition gives a good idea of the advance of aviation in the last few years, and indicates why the bird men have played such a large part in the European conflict.

To match the speed demon in the air, there has been arranged for the same afternoon, motorcycle contests to be staged on the mile track at the Fair grounds. The foremost speed artists of the country are to be present to take part in the exhibition. As there is probably nothing faster on wheels than the demonic little motorcycle, a meet full of thrills and plenty of excitement is assured.

The two busy days of the Cherry Fair are to be followed by a solid week of the Salem Chautauquus, which is to be held July 5-12. It is thought that many from the surrounding country will probably plan to spend ten days in Salem and take in the entire bill.

## NO MORE GOPHER BOUNTIES IN 1915

The appropriation for the payment of bounties on 43,450 gopher and mole scalps was exhausted June 29th. No further payments for bounty can be made this year. The bounty money was exhausted much sooner than was first anticipated, as over 20,000 scalps were received in the past ten days. The last Legislature made an annual appropriation of one-tenth of one mill for this purpose, so that all scalps taken between now and the end of this year can be brought into the office on or after January 23, next year, and the bounty paid for them.

In the scalping of gophers, parties should be careful to secure the entire scalp, which consists of the skin of the face including the eyes and ears to the tip of the nose, but not including the pockets. Gopher scalps containing only the snouts are not sufficient. If the scalps are stretched on a board with the skin side out, tacked on with three or four tacks and thoroughly dried before stringing on a string, they will last indefinitely, as it is only necessary to keep out the moths. Most parties find it more successful in drying the scalps without salts, as the salt has a tendency to draw moisture every night.

The appropriation for the payment of bounty is continuing and will be in effect until the law is repealed. Extreme care should be taken in the preservation of scalps, as no scalps will be received that are moth eaten or have maggots, or are not properly stretched and dried.

## VERY IMPORTANT

Scalps cannot be sold or given away. They must be presented for receiving bounty by the party killing the gophers or moles, or by an agent duly authorized in writing. In every case the warrant is made payable to the original party.

The County Court has offered a reward of \$25.00 for information leading to the conviction of anyone violating the bounty law or importing scalps from another county.

## RETURNS FROM TRIP

The Rev. D. Juneman of Jordan made his regular annual trip to his old home in Olympia, Washington, last week, returning Saturday. His congregation at Jordan is building him a fine new 5-room bungalow with cement basement. The new hall at that place is about completed. It is laid with a maple floor and will be an ornament to the community.
