MRS. APPALONA GEHLEN DIED HERE SATURDAY

Mrs. Appalona Gehlen died at her home here on Saturday, July 24.

She was born in Alsace in Germany in 1851, and came to America with her parents at the age of one year.

Her parents first settled in Illinois near Chicago and later moved to Galena in the same state where she was married to Theodore Gehlen when she was 19 years of age.

From Illinois the young couple moved to Lamar, Iowa, where they lived until 1892, when they came to Stayton, settling on a farm near here.

Mr. Gehlen died several years ago, and was a well known merchant of this city for several years before his death.

The funeral services were held in the Catholic church in this city and were attended by a large crowd of relatives, friends and neighbors. Rev. Laine officiated.

Interment was in the Sublimity cemetery by the side of her husband, who is buried there.

MONSTER WHEAT HEADS ON EXHIBITION HERE

Samuel Aplet of this city brought a couple of dozen heads of wheat into the Mail office one day in the latter part of last week that would make an Eastern man's eyes open wide, to say the least.

The heads will average 4 1/2 inches in length, and by actual count will average 90 grains to the head.

The variety is one of the Willamette Valley standards, called "Probi" wheat which was introduced here many years ago; and to judge from the specimen in the Mail office, has not deteriorated in that time.

While it is true that this particular specimen was raised in Mr. Aplet's garden and given some cultivation, still it shows what a judicious amount of fertilizer, and a little attention will do.

It would not be out of place here to mention that Mr. Aplet is a gardener of the first order, and his place always looks clean, neat and not a weed in sight. Mr. Aplet came from Switzerland, where they can truly appreciate the blessing of a prolific soil like the Santiam bottom.
