- Every exhibitor is expected to plant, cultivate, and harvest crops, care for poultry, and must make with no other help than advice, his or her own mechanical, needlework, cooking and canning exhibits.
- A signed statement to this effect will be required of each exhibitor.
- Parents and teachers are asked to co-operate in securing absolute honesty on the part of exhibitors.
- No pupil shall make more than one entry for each prize.
- Exhibits should be brought to the building on September 23.
- Open to all districts in Marion and Linn Cos.
- In case of no competition, prize will be awarded at the discretion of the judges.
