HOW THE COUNTY'S BUSINESS HAS INCREASED

County Clerk's office comparing 1911-12 with 1913-14.

The work in the office has increased 25% in the past two years, but in spite of this there is a slight decrease in the cost of salaries and clerk hire for the regular office work and only a slight increase in the cost of extra help for registration and election purposes. The fees turned in for the last two year period are an increase of \$1,391.45, but the principal increases in work are in two departments of the office in which no fees are collected, The Commissioner's Court Department and The Election Department, 40% of the office's expenses are in the Commissioner's Court Department, formerly a 2 mill road tax was levied and last year the tax was 4 mills, almost doubling the work of bookkeeping and auditing for that year.

The other main increase is in the election department. Women suffrage almost doubled the number of voters and caused twice as much work in Registration. An extra Registration was held in 1913 under the Gill Bill, and a special election was held in 1913. 9056 voters were registered in 1911-12 and a total of 22,955 in 1913-14, which more than doubled the former work. In Department No. 2 of the Circuit Court the deputy clerk is doing the work of the Bailiff making a further saving of about \$400.00 per year.
