The Largest Frog.

Among the rare specimens not open
to public inspection in the Harvard
zoological museum is what is claimed
to be the largest frog in the world. It
weighs about six pounds, is twenty-
seven inches long from tip to toe and
of a slaty black color. Its web feet
are equal in size to those of a large
swan. But three of its kind have ever
reached the United States. Dr. Boul-
enger of the British museum was the
discoverer of the new species in 1895
while on an expedition in central Af-
rica. All known specimens have been
found in two districts, called Kribi and
Etulan, of the German colony Kamerun.
