## AUMSVILLE CORN SHOW WAS DECIDED SUCCESS

The Aumsville corn show, in session Friday and Saturday, closed with a special session attended by more than 200, addressed by L. J. Chapin, who illustrated his lecture with stereopticon slides.

The show was a success in every respect, not only from the large number of entries and fine quality of the exhibits, but also from the large attendance each session. For the 100 ear prize, there was 14 entries, three for the best general display and 20 for the best 10 ears displayed. Many entries were made of sweet corn and popcorn.

Saturday afternoon, a board for the coming year was elected, of which C. B. McCulley is president, O. E. Darby, vice-president, T. W. Johnson, secretary; H. C. Von Behren, treasurer, and Clair Donker, trustee. This board is already laying plans for next year.

The entire time from Friday morning to late in the afternoon was spent in discussion of subjects dear to an editor's heart, whether he be high or low. The Commercial Club of Salem had provided a splendid banquet at the Marion Hotel for the visiting newspaper men and their wives, and to say that it was enjoyed would be but stating a mild truth. The meeting of the Gridiron Club after the banquet was but one more proof that editors can talk as well as write.

The Saturday morning session was spent at the state house listening to many good addresses, not the least among which was the editor of the Oregonian. The noon luncheon was taken at the State Hospital as guests of the Board of Control, Gov. Withycombe, Secretary Oleott and Treasurer Kay.

After the noon luncheon, which was all that could possibly be desired, the visitors went through the hospital and noted that everything was clean, sanitary and comfortable for the unfortunate people who are the inmates.

The penitentiary was next visited, and a band concert by the inmates listened to that fairly made the heavy walls tremble.

Taking it all in all, it was one of the most pleasant experiences the writer, who with his better half were among the number, had ever had, and he knows that he voices the sentiment of every member of the association when he thanks Salem, Salem's Commercial Club and the Board of Control for their splendid entertainment.

Work will commence on the new line as soon as possible, and in the meantime the work on the plant here is progressing nicely, and soon will be in a condition to furnish any amount of juice for lights and power.
