**High School Notes**

The teachers of the grades and high school are planning to give a series of entertainments this winter, the first to be given just before Christmas. These entertainments will be given for the purpose of securing money for the various school purposes, such as books, play ground equipment, etc. With the High School chorus and orchestra these should be the best ever given in Stayton.

The school will endeavor to secure the traveling library of the State Library Commission so that the people of the district may secure good reading material at any time.

On Friday evening the new High School Building was thrown open to the public for inspection. A crowd of about three hundred looked over the building and enjoyed the program which had been prepared by the faculty and members of the school board.

Dr. H. A. Beauchamp opened the program with a splendid address of welcome in which he complimented the people on the splendid move they made in erecting the new building.

The next speaker was Miss Helen Cowgill, who gave a very interesting talk on the value of Domestic Science. It is the hope of the High School faculty and girls that domestic science will be installed in the Stayton schools in the near future.

Mr. F. L. Griffin, of Corvallis,

gave a splendid stereopticon lecture on the advantages of agriculture club work to the boys and girls of the state.

Other interesting features of the program were talks by Co. School Supt. W. M. Smith, Mr. Olmsted, Rev. Lockhart, Rev. Lawrence, Supervisor Smith and Rev. Putnam. The high school orchestra and Chorus added greatly to the program through the selections which they rendered. Miss Wanda Brown is to be complimented on her rendition of Waltz Chromatique.
