EUROPE ASKS BIDS ON TRENCH STAKES

Allies Want 8,000,000 Feet Fir From Portland Mills.

SEEK SPRUCE TO BUILD AEROPLANES

Railroads Buy Material for Thousand Freight Cars—Order Must Be Filled in Three Months.

Portland—Lumber mills have been asked to bid on an order for 8,000,000 feet of trench posts and pickets for use by the allied powers in the war zone.

The posts are to be 2x4 inches and four feet long, sharpened at one end, and will be used for stringing barbed wire along the trenches.

A large domestic order for lumber for railroad cars has been placed with the Douglas Fir Lumber company, of Portland.

The European governments are also in the Portland market for as much high-grade spruce as can be obtained.

The allies' agents for trench posts have been authorized to ask for bids in Portland and British Columbia.

The domestic order which has been placed with the Douglas Fir Lumber company of Portland calls for 2,000,000 feet of Douglas fir to be used in the construction of 1000 automobile cars and 500 stock car for the Chicago & Northwestern railroad.
