Frank Reisterer and family are moving to the Regina Becker home this week, where he intends to make his home for the coming years.

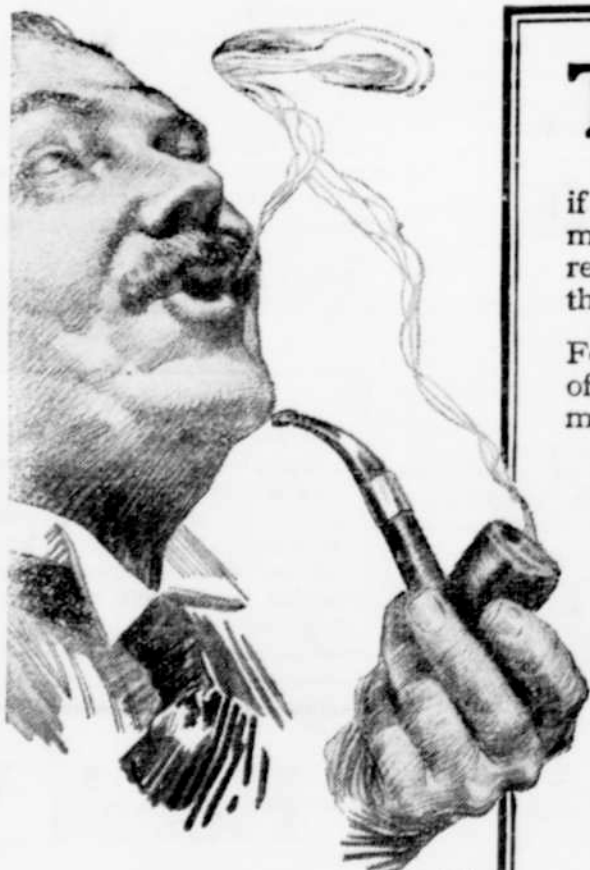
Sister Lucille of St. Mary's Home and Sister Imelda of this place attended the Institute at Turner, Saturday.
