IVAN G. MARTIN

Republican Candidate for the Nomination for Representative

I was born on a farm in 1881 and have passed most of the 35 years of my life in Oregon. My earlier years were spent on a farm where I learned how hard it is to gather the dollars from the soil and how heavily the yearly tax payment bore on the farmer. I am a moderate tax payer with property in three counties of Oregon and I am reminded from three sources that taxes are growing steadily and becoming more and more burdensome. I state this only to show that I sympathize with the tax payer and that anything that I can do to lessen the load will be done, for I am in the same boat with other taxpayers of Marion county.

I realize that we must have good schools, and good roads and that these are necessities which we can not do without and must pay for. Certainly we can not hope for returns in any line without some investment. I believe in progress and improvement but I believe that both should be made in a sensible and rational way without extravagance. I believe that we should reduce our running expenses to the minimum commensurate with efficiency and give our encouragement to those activities in which we are all interested; rural credits, co-operation, home industries which I believe will stimulate business and bring a greater prosperity to our county and state. I do not mean to convey the idea that I believe the state should make appropriations for the benefit of corporations or private interests to establish "home industries"—no but we can advertise, invite and economically encourage the establishment of such industries and we can even conduct and operate such industries as do not enter into competition with those already established.

Among these is the flax industry which in time will be a great asset to Marion county. It is unnecessary for me to say that factories and mills with large pay rolls and using commodities raised or owned by our farmers and citizens will bring prosperity to our county.

This policy will, I believe help solve the tax question in two ways, first by reducing it directly and secondly by bringing about better business conditions making taxation easier. In other words I believe that state and county affairs should be run in the same careful and economical way that the business man would conduct his own affairs, and will if elected earnestly work for the realization of this ideal.

I was employed as a clerk in one of Salem's mercantile establishments for some time and was connected with the Capital Journal for upwards of two years and in that capacity learned to sort the true from the false and also learned that no man is so wise but that every other man can enlighten him about something.

I hold diplomas from the law department of the University of California and from three departments of the Willamette University. I have practiced law here in Salem for several years and I think that I am equipped for passing intelligently on such bills as may come before the legislature. I am convinced that the state is burdened with commissions some of which we could do without and the complex and expensive systems of others could be simplified. I believe that we should have a rural credit system planned for the benefit of the farmer rather than a set of commissioners to manage it.

Whatever will benefit the county or state will get my earnest support, —all I ask is a trial and if I do not make good, it will not be because I do not try.
