CURTIS COLE ADDS HEAD TO HERD

Curtis Cole who lives over on the Linn county side near Kingston, is going into the stock business right. After getting the nucleus of a nice line of registered Shorthorns, he cast about looking for a bull to head his herd, and finally settled on Gay Victor, a yearling, weighing 1100 pounds, from the famous McCosky herd of 400 registered animals, of Fish Trap, Wash.

When questioned as to the price paid for this animal, Mr. Cole shook his head and said: "Enough."

Gay Victor is sired by Gold Mine II, a 2600 lb. bull that has sired more show animals than any other on the coast. His dam is a 1900 lb. cow of pure breeding and there is no better bred calf (if one can call an eleven hundred pound yearling, a calf) west of the Rocky mountains than Gay Victor.

Mr. Cole expects to devote his entire time to taking care of his high class cattle and intends to make the rounds of the fairs the coming fall. Some will have to look well to their laurels.

REASONS FOR ELECTING McMAHAN

There is a growing conviction among the voters of Marion county that L. H. McMahan should be elected district attorney because of his superior qualifications for the office over his competitors. It is likely that his majority at the polls will reflect this conviction in the most decisive manner.

Mr. McMahan is an independent candidate in the fullest sense, both of the leading political parties having nominees in the field. He is without partisan backing because he was urged into the race by business men and farmers who realize that a man of positive character and good legal ability should be chosen to fill this important place. McMahan has shown in many instances that he knows how to fight an important case through court and win it in the end. He is fearless and independent but fair and just as a prosecutor.
