SUMMONS

In the Circuit Court of the State of Oregon, for the County of Marion, Department No. 2. Grant Murphy as Administrator of the Estate of G. W. Murphy, deceased, plaintiff, vs. C. E. Ashley, defendant.

To the above named defendant, C. E. Ashley: In the name of the state of Oregon, you are hereby required to appear and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled Court and cause within six weeks from the date of the first publication of this summons, to-wit: Nov. 30th, 1916 and if you fail to answer for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the Court for the relief prayed for in his complaint herein; to-wit: 1st. OREGON INDUSTRIAL REVIEW

Railroading, Shipbuilding, Lumbering and Farming are the Big Industries in Oregon. Hold Down Taxes and Eliminate Radical Legislation at Coming Session of Legislature and Encourage Further Development

Salem, States assessed valuation for 1916 is \$877,754,944 which is \$55,731,078 less than year previous. Tax levy for 1917 to be \$2,699,250 compared to \$2,550,000 for 1916.

Portland, \$21,500 paid for prize bull at International Live Stock Show.

Eugene, S. P. pays over one tenth taxes of Lane county.

Oregon flax fibre found adequate for manufacture of fishermen's twine which now sells at \$2.35 a pound.

Oregon City, Crown Willamette Paper Mills, Hawley Paper mills and the woolen mills all give Christmas presents to total of 1700 employees.

The Pilot Rock Record's annual Christmas edition of 36 pages chuck full of business and illustration, well printed and of excellent mechanical make up, is a most enterprising piece of work in a town of less than 1000 population. The good advertising such a paper gives the town cannot be estimated.

Grants Pass, Irrigation of 10,000 acres proposed near here.

Politicians would do well to heed the sentiment of the public and hold down taxes and pass a minimum of legislation at the coming session of the legislature.

Portland, Southern Pacific gives 10 per cent of yearly salary to all employees receiving less than \$2500 who are not members of four brotherhoods, Pacific Telephone Company gives from two to three weeks salary addition to all employees. Portland Gas & Coke, General Electric and many others make substantial gifts.

Linn county builds 70 miles of road past year, graveled or rocked.

The Bergman Shoe Co. of Portland is enlarging its output and has added a waterproofing shoe oil to its line of products. The report that Mr. Bergmann has sold his interest in the company is untrue.

Swedish shipping concern with headquarters at Stockholm announces that within next two years it will have fleet of motor ships operating between west coast of North and South America and Sweden, with Portland as one of the ports of entry.

Canby, Clackamas County News, M. J. Lee editor, is a brand new paper and declares itself "an independent newspaper, devoted to the upbuilding and best interests of one of the best counties of the state.

Estacada plans establishment of milk condensery or cheese factory.

Corvallis, new straight line state highway proposed from here to Independence.

Salem, \$33,619,902 invested in plants and equipment of various timber industries in Oregon.

Portland, Twohoy Bros. get contract to build 200 freight cars for Union Pacific system.
