We have been running a series of articles on the Industries of Stayton for the past two months and have only one more industry to write up which will be covered next week. We do not know how much good these articles will accomplish but we always hope for the best and it is not amiss for us to make some suggestions right here. There are two industries that we call to mind at present that could be located here to the advantage of the farmers, the owners of the plants and the town. These are a cannery and a creamery, of course at present the amount of fruit and vegetables that are raised hereabouts would not run a cannery very long, but if some live man with a little capital would come in and open up a plant of this kind and let the farmers know what his purpose was they would be only too glad of the opportunity to supply him with whatever products he would want, as an abundance of those products can be raised right here at home and the same thing can be said for a creamery.

Industrial Activity Continues, New Factories Open. Sawmills, Railroads and Other Industries Spending large Sums Bringing Their Properties to the Highest State of Efficiency.

Rice industry to be established on Long Tom river bottom land, in Lane county.

Klamath Falls voted March 7th on acquiring \$45,000 high school site.

Cottage Grove firm will manufacture ready-cut houses and barns.

E. M. Olmsted retires from Stayton Mail with a fine record for progress.

State sold carload of flaxseed for \$4,225.00, \$2.75 a bushel.

Roseburg Review would limit number of bills at one session to 160.

Gresham fruit growers will rebuild burned cannery.

Point Arena, Cal.
