With reference to the latter topic the minister holds that men to are guilty in committing the gossip evil and will pay his respects to them as well as the other sex. The sermon he holds is one applicable to any community and especially perhaps, the small towns. All are respectfully invited to the above services.

The federal district court of Utah has denied the suit of the government asking that the Central Pacific and Southern Pacific unmerge. The court held that it was not shown that ownership and operation under one management had injuriously affected shippers. Judge Sanborn asked: "If no wrong to shippers has been shown, how can the court issue an injunction?"

The court held that under one management "the government and the people were being served adequately.

Many years of litigation have held up the development of the Central Pacific property and many communities.

The law suit has prevented completion of what is called the Natron cutoff from Springfield, Oregon to Weed, California.

The Southern Pacific had completed that line, all but 100 miles, obviating the heavy grade over siskyu mountains.

Of course, the Government lawyer will appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States and further delay construction.
