Their addresses were entertaining and instructive and will doubtless result in much good.

The mass meeting for men in the evening held at the same place brought out a large number of men and while Dr. Griffiths was unable to attend the two local physicians divided his time between them and all present learned some things at least that will do them good the remainder of their life. Dr. Littler of Albany delivered his scheduled address and spoke in plain language so that all could understand. The work the Society is doing is educational and beneficial and the results obtained thus far are gratifying indeed for it will make for better and stronger men and women mentally, morally and physically and anything that will tend to improve the human family is indeed worthy of our support.

## Girl's National Honor Guard

The Girl's National Honor Guard of Stayton, Oregon, has now been completely organized and are taking hold of the work with great enthusiasm. The present officers are: Leader, Mrs. C. H. Brewer; Ass't., Leader, Miss Grace Elder; Sec., C. C. Mielke; Ass't., Sec., Ruth Roy; Treas., Caryl Rubie.

There are three divisions of the work but at the present time it is deemed inadvisable to take up the last division, that of handling machinery, driving cars etc.

The First Division, of which Miss Grace Elder is leader, consists of a course of lectures on First Aid work. Dr. Brewer has the lectures in charge and will give one lecture a week, finishing by the time school is out when an examination will be given. If those taking the examination make a passing grade of 70 per cent a Girl's National Honor Guard Certificate will be given them, enabling them to enter any Honor Guard anywhere. The first lecture was given Thursday May 8th.

Division two of which Mrs. M. J. Crabtree is the leader takes up a course on knowledge and care of children, to be followed later by lessons on plain and diet cooking and plain sewing.

A course of Military drills and marching is being given to the girl's each Thursday evening. Mr. Davie has this work in charge.

Hereafter all the lectures will be given on Thursday afternoon and evening as follows: Division 2, from 1 until 2 o'clock, division 1 from 3:45 until 5 o'clock, and military drill from 7:45 until 9 o'clock.

Miss Ruth Roy, acting in Miss Mielke's absence, has sent in the names and dues of all those who have signed the pledge and paid their dues.

Last Thursday evening a general meeting was held, where it was decided to accept Mr. Hoerith's offer and take charge of the show Saturday evening, May 26. They are to get half the proceeds after the films are paid for.

May 14.—Eugene Fruit Growers' Association receives single contract for \$400,000 worth of canned turnips, carrots, squash, cabbage and green beans.

Sutherlin—Many beans being planted here.

Eugene—Broccoli planting starts in this section.

Vale—Large chrome and magnesia deposits to be prospected in Malheur county.

Coos Bay—More shipyards in prospect here.

North Bend—Buehner Co., gives raise in mens wages. Increase of 25 cents a day is announced—expected that this action will tend to settle labor troubles at plant.
